Introduction to the Third Volume of the Aguipo Global South Journal

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The All UP Academic Employees Union Cebu Chapter is happy to present the third volume of the *Aguipo Global South Journal* (AGSJ). It contains provocative articles that bring readers to various issues that confront the Global South, both in the theoretical as well as practical levels. The issue is composed by both articles and book reviews.

The articles section is opened by Sayan Dey's "Suffocations and Breathing: Flash Mobs as a Decolonial Exercise of Wellbeing in India." By transposing both the notions of suffocation and breathing from the biological to the social sphere, Dey illustrated how some instances of flash mobs in contemporary India provide opportunities for individuals to breathe. Dey's article is followed by Marlon Aeron Salvador's "Women in the Liturgy in the Vision of Pope Francis." Here, Salvador answered the question "where is the rightful place of women in the liturgy," by investigating Pope Francis' vision as well as Elisabeth Schussler Fiorenza's theology of ekklesia of women. The third article is Jerry Imbong's "The Decolonial Turn in Filipino Philosophy." J. Imbong retraced the colonial legacy of academic philosophy especially in the Philippines and developed what he believed could be a path towards a decolonial turn in Filipino Philosophy. The fourth article is Regletto Aldrich Imbong's "Mahinungdanong Kabilin: Ang Panghuna-huna ni Jose Maria Sison." R. Imbong argued what he described are the five enduring theoretical and practical legacies of the Maoist revolutionary leader Jose Maria Sison. This article is also the first non-English and Bisaya publication of the AGSJ. The last article is "Leadership Whoism: An Examination of Udofia's Perpspective in the Light of Nigerian Leadership Crisis" by Ithowo Paul Ignatius, Francis Okon Ating, and Oto-Obong. Through the lens of Udofia's leadership philosophy, the authors argued for a virtue-based method of leadership that will helpfully address the leadership crisis of a post-Independence Nigeria.

The two book reviews are by Ana Borges Jelinic and Jerry Imbong. Jelinic reviewed the book by Anne Marie D'Aoust entitled *Transnational Marriage and Partner Migration:* Constellations of Security, Citizenship, and Rights. Imbong reviewed the book by Ramon Echica entitled *Jesus for Filipinos: Reflections on Philippine Social Issues in the Light of the Gospel*.
